



<u>Q1</u> How important is it to you that Stillwater offers a recycling service? (668 responses by locals)



Q2 About how often do you use the weekly curbside recycling service in Stillwater?




Q3 Which of the following materials do you regularly recycle, if any? (Choose all that apply) (590 responses by locals)



Thank you for providing this service.

It's really difficult to know exactly what is acceptable and what is not acceptable to put in the recycling bins, so more often than not we don't use it in order to avoid the possible fine. I understand that there has to be a penalty to cover costs of putting unrecyclable materials in the recycling bin, but I'd rather just not chance it, as much as I hate not recycling what we can.

I think it would present a wrong image of our City to completely do away with the recycling service.

I remember the old days of manually bringing our recycling to community bins. What a pain! The current service is outstanding and I would gladly pay more to keep it going.

Dual stream is hard to wrap my head around. Where would cans go? I am very happy to put paper products in a different bin. We recycle weekly, but could do so biweekly. This service is very important to me.

Let's go back to the collection centers around town if we can't make curbside pick up work.

Enforce the rules concerning what to recycle and cleanliness of deposited materials.

Make it available downtown for apartments and businesses, also make it available in all apartment complexes

If recyclable materials end up in the landfills anyway, how responsible is the government for going through the motions to fulfill some folks need to be socially affluent? Paying fees for a program that does not achieve it's goal is reckless and does not serve the citizens' need for financial responsible government.

How much would ending the glass recycling program reduce the deficit? Not all recyclables are valued the same.

I love the recycling program. My recycling cart is always full whereas my trash has now been reduced to one bag a week. I make sure to check all my plastics and only recycle what is supposed to be in there, I hate that a minority who seem to think it's their 2nd trash cart could ruin the program for everyone else.

I would support every-other-week pick up that also includes picking up glass recyclables every-other-week instead of just once a month.

Please do not get rid of recycling in Stillwater! I think it is one of the things that makes our quality of living higher than any of the surrounding areas.

Everyone should pay for recycling. Make a universal fee. Those fees need to add up to our current costs. For those that choose to self sort (dual, triple stream) they should qualify for a discount based on good behavior. Also allow for people to deliver their recyclables themselves to the managed facility. Those people get an even bigger discount because they are saving the cost of transportation.

Is there an opportunity to create businesses in Stillwater to utilize the recyclable materials, rather than rely on world demand to determine prices/cost effectiveness?

Recycling is very difficult living in apartments in Stillwater. Our carts end up grouped together and people frequently put their garbage in my recycling bin, which causes issues (getting carts taken away). Now I use glass recycling and the convenience center, but getting there during open hours is difficult. Well. That wouldn't let me list my preferences in order, so I'm going to try it here~ 1) every other week; 2) paying more to keep it as is; 3) dual stream (with info about where aluminum would go); and lastly, not having it. I strongly prefer having it, but I do understand the cost concerns with recycling today.

If you end up canceling all recycling services, I expect a significant reduction in my bill. In other words, you've asked these questions without giving even ballpark figures. An increase of 100% sounds like a lot. But if it's a 50 cent charge changing to a \$1 charge, then who cares. If it's a \$10

charge changing to a \$20 charge, then there's cause for discussion.

I find it asinine to even explore reducing recycling. The technology and capabilities are easily and readily available and should be used. If costs need to be cut the costs should come from a reduction in payroll of the city employees that are being paid waaaaaaaay above their output. ie, when I worked for the parks department, employees were making \$20/hour to weedeat about 4 hours a week. Sons of those employees are still employed and make even more now I'm sure.

I really love our recycling program and think that it is so important. Please don't get rid of it.

I like the sticker reminding residents "no plastic bags". To encourage shoppers to bring their own bags to the store, here's what I've seen in some parts of the world: cashiers ask shoppers if they need shopping bags. In these places, reusable bags are always available for a small fee at the cash register. Free, flimsy bags are available, but the LEAST encouraged option.

If we rely on people to take their recycling to the center in their own vehicles, many people, myself included, will not do it.

Please maintain this critical service, along with strong encouragement for general reduction in consumption and increased use of reusable containers/bags in Stillwater businesses and other establishments!

If you get rid of recycling or make it an optional pay service, I would expect you to go back to the twice weekly pickup schedule for trash like you used to have.

Wish the schools could recycle their lunch containers. Wish there was a styrofoam option. Wish we had a payment for businesses who generate most trash/non-recyclable products. For example have Walmart pay a fee for using plastic bags and not encouraging other options.

Please keep our recycling program and focus on educating the public how to accurately recycle.

Given that the science is extremely clear that we are facing a climate apocalypse, it feels pretty scary that the city is considering rolling back recycling. I'd like to see the city support more visionary approaches to helping Stillwater become greener!

I appreciate being supplied with bins for recycling. Also I appreciate repairs and/or replacement of damaged bins.

Separating plastics from other recycled materials might allow for more plastics to be recycled. Currently, some plastic containers are not marked, so they have to go into the regular trash cart.

I would rather have to pay more and have recycling then wind up paying more and not have it. I love curbside but can go back to taking it to the convenience center. Are you considering shutting that down too?

Our recycling cart is full each week. We are open to any other possibilities the city is exploring. We appreciate you finding solutions this problem.

I am worried that recycling is not actually doing any good now that China does not purchase our debris. Can the city confirm that our recycling program is properly handling our materials?

I want my recycling

We use about half of our recycling cart volume every week. If we had no recycling service, that recycling volume would undoubtedly end up in the trash. In general, we'd gladly go to greater pains to separate streams if that's what it took to make recycling work. It's working fine for us with glass, for example.

This should not cost us more and if it comes down to that we need the choice to opt out.

The addition of recycling has been one of the biggest improvements to Stillwater in the past 10 or so years.

Recycling is absolutely essential to maintain our community. While some cost-cutting measures may be acceptable we cannot tolerate a reduction in service. If costs are increasing funds will need to appropriated from elsewhere or a tax rate hike should be enforced. Our community should consider expanding recycling services and we should asking the community to re-affirm our commitment to preserving the environment.

Please keep the recycling program

I would also be willing to pay more in order to expand the recycling offerings to more materials.

Recycling shouldn't just be a residential thing. There should be support for businesses that want to recycle too, since they often generate more waste. Also, it would be nice to know how costly/profitable each recyclable type is.

I LOVE having curbside recycling and find it very important

I would very happily sort my recycling into multiple compartments based on type of item and pay more for weekly recycling services! Although I would be substantially inconvenienced by a reduction of the curbside collection service to once every two weeks, this would be better than nothing! I would benefit from easier access to information (and regular updates/reminders) regarding what can and cannot be recycled. I would also benefit from extended opening hours at the convenience center and/or more unmanned drop-offs around town. I care deeply about recycling and would be bitterly disappointed to see the curbside collection discontinued. It would be a step in the wrong direction, in every sense. I am wiling to pay what it will cost to keep the service going.

I realize there is a problem with people using their carts as second trash cans. One solution was to remove recycling from transient student housing altogether. I happen to live in such "transient student housing" for years in the same spot and would like a recycling cart but don't have access to one because my apt is serviced by a dumpster. The system should be flexible enough to address situations where people want to recycle but can't and people who don't care spoil the situation for the rest of us.

I really hate to see us go backwards on this! I think the dual stream will be the death knell of it - most people will not drag two containers out to the street. I would rather see us go back to having to take glass recycling to the center than to see the current single-stream system go down. We've already cut back on the plastics you will accept. Twice a month, separate stream recycling seems like it could be a better long term solution, reducing collection costs (via frequency reduction) while also (hopefully) reducing contamination. Personally I would not have a problem separating further. We already do this with glass pickup, so another bin or two won't really be a problem. Thank you!

It would be difficult to switch to every other week because we generate so much recycling, but if that's what it took to save the program, sure.

Our planet counts on us to do the right thing, there is no plan B.

Maybe a household or business needs to generate a certain amount of recyclables to qualify for curbside service. Everyone else must take it to the recycling center. It could create an incentive for households to recycle. I also think there could be more promotion and support from the community.

The only reason I would be hesitant to go to an every other week recycling pickup would be remembering what week it is and potentially missing a pickup.

I believe recycling is an easy but extremely important way each of us can contribute to a healthier and more sustainable environment. I do not want to live in a community that does not make recycling a priority.

Restaurants should not be allowed to use styrofoam containers. Downtown alleys should have more cardboard recycling containers and businesses should be using them more. Lots of cardboard is placed in regular trash containers. Does the City recycle? Does SMC recycle?

I prefer to have different carts or bins for each recyclable material. I recycle because I care about the environment so I'm happy to sort. I put hands on each item anyway, and think its wasteful (time and labor) to just throw everything in one bin. Bottle, can and glass collection centers at beer distributors or liquor stores (Example: in NY some beer distributors that are the size of half of JR's, or approximately the size of Stillwater Wine and Spirits) allow you to come with bags of bottles - they take them, weigh or count them, give money back to the customer, then ship the recyclables out as a large quantity. 3. Collect glass curbside, please.

I definitely use the recycling program in Stillwater and I would be extremely disappointed if the curbside recycling went away.

I think that offering a recycling program in Stillwater is important for our environment, and it sets a good example for our citizens and neighboring towns. I was surprised to see how much it was costing the city, though. That's a sizable bill for us. I don't think that people would agree to pay more in utilities to maintain the program, sadly. I hope that reducing the service days, changing the type of recycling we do, or something else will work and the program won't need to be abandoned.

I don't support this service to the extent it would take from other quality of life services provided by the City or supported by City funding. I'm not against recycling, just don't want something more important to get pushed out as a result of increased recycling costs.

\$700K and growing is a lot of money for a warm feeling and limited environmental benefit. The city should consider developing a plan to encourage companies to start local operations to make products from recycled materials and even evaluate the potential of some clean incineration plant to produce electricity from other solid waste or at least use methane capture at solid waste sites.
